## Dr Kyaw Chit, Programme Analyst (SRHR), UNFPA (Myanmar)

Dr Kyaw Chit is a medical doctor from Myanmar with a MSc Public Health for Development degree from LSHTM. He has 10 years of experience in the field of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights and is currently a Programme Analyst (SRHR) at UNFPA Myanmar.

In this position, he works closely with the Ministry of Health and Sports' Maternal and Reproductive Health division and development partners at both national and subnational levels.

Prior to the current position, he worked as a National Consultant for UNFPA Southeast region office in Myanmar to coordinate with the government and civil society organizations to strengthen SRHR and Gender-based violence responses.

His experiences also include working with Marie Stopes Myanmar on implementation, research, and monitoring of SRHR programmes and clinical services, and with University of Medicine-1 on research on post-abortion care.
