



Marketing yourself

Consider, are you:

- –Generalist or specialist?
- Career changer or early career?
- –What is your focus of interest?
- –What skills and strengths do you want to highlight?
- How can you briefly describe your 'story'?

Use tools such as LinkedIn to market yourself but also to research ideas – check our <u>short videos on using LinkedIn</u>





Tailoring your CV and covering letter?

- View the job description, pay close attention to the 'person specification' / 'application requirements'
- Research work this employer is involved in what skills do you think they would want for this type of work?
- Evidence in your CV how you meet the requirements of this job
- Use the Cover letter to further evidence your motivation for applying, why you're interested in their company and, what makes you a suitable candidate for interview






Networks

- Connect/message with alumni



Applying



- Research the organisation thoroughly
- Tailor your application form and or CV/cover letter to the job
- Submit
- Depending on sector and type of organisation, selection process may include:
 - Online tests
 - -Video interview
 - -Telephone interview
 - Assessment centre tasks
 - Face to face interview



Speculative applications

A valuable approach for some sectors/types of organisation

- Charities/NGOs;
- Smaller organisations;
- Niche employers.

Jobs advertised widely are likely to be the more senior jobs

Speculative applications are particularly relevant for short term opportunities (which may be a stepping stone)



The Speculative Application – how?

- Research the organisation thoroughly
- Introduce yourself
- Show your understanding of the company and why YOU are particularly interested in working with THEM
- Spell out what you can offer
- Request an informal interview
- Try to find a contact at the organisation to speak to before making a direct approach about possible jobs

Job research

'Follow the money' – in other words, be aware of where money is flowing (what geographic areas, what issues) - that is where the jobs are going to be.

Build momentum towards your ideal – be prepared to compromise on the way, eg

- Organisation you want, but not ideal job;
- Ideal job but not ideal topic/issue;
- Ideal job but not ideal organisation;
- Ideal job but not ideal location;
- Ideal location but not ideal job etc.



Matching ideas with reality

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PESTLE analysis:
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P = political;

E = economic;

S = social;

T = technological;

L = legal;

E = environmental.

Notes from the talk (and the Q&A)

Question: why did you pick those first three countries first (Tanzania, Malawi, Uganda)?

Answer: Chose Sub-Saharan Africa because such low expenditure there. Such low ratio of health professionals to level of health. Then had to pick countries that it was possible to succeed in – countries already asking questions and wanting the support, and English speaking. Then some input from US government in terms of choice. Have to look at big picture, for example PEPFAR is an HIV focused agency, but you have to recognise that other weaknesses in health systems allow HIV to flourish.



- Research the country (or countries).






Levels of experience required

- Tips on using LinkedIn on <u>Careers Moodle Sourcing</u> and applying for jobs (recordings) – <u>LinkedIn</u>.




Research – informational interviews
